
Unite - the union of Jack Jones

68 is too late: don't raise the state pension age campaign

On May 2nd, Unite, the NPC and supporters gathered in London and Edinburgh to hand in 36,484 petition signatures opposing further rises in the state pension age.

We were joined by some Labour MPs and MSPs, and the demonstrations received ex-tensive press coverage including in the Mirror, Morning Star, Daily Record, the Express and many local news outlets.

Gender Pension Gap

The cut-off date for the former state pension was 6 April 2016 for women born before 1953. The Basic State Pension pre 2016 was very complicated and outdated because married women could build up a pension based on their husband's working life - though this assumed they would not be divorced or widowed. There was simply too much complexity partly because it was based on previous NI contributions and earnings. It was difficult to work out how much pension would ultimately be available on retirement for any individual. The New State Pension simplified this making it easier to work out how much pension an individual can claim. The full credit is 35 years of work with 10 years minimum. It is based on the individual and there is no widow's pension.

The biggest fault with both the old and new pension is that they simply aren't enough to live on. Women have been, and continue to be, badly let down by the pensions system and there is a large disparity between the income of women pensioners and that of men. Due in part to breaks in employment for caring responsibilities. For the low paid, mostly women, greater reliance is placed on the state pension because they simply cannot afford to make contributions to occupational pensions.

Wemustcontinuetocampaignforimprovements to the State Pension and overcome the growing disparity between the basic old state pension of £156.20 a week and the new state pension of £203.85 per week. Add to this the scandal of WASPI women and the tens of thou-sands of women who were underpaid their state pensions by up to 60%. It just builds injustice on injustice.

The NPC Pensions and Incomes Working Party is currently working to revise its guidance book on the State Pension.

Take The Power Back – bring energy back into public ownership

Household bills have hit record levels. While millions of energy consumers struggle to pay astronomical bills, the energy sector is making eye watering profits.

This comes at a huge cost. In our new report Renationalising energy: costs and savings Unite found:

- Public ownership could have saved us nearly £45 billion in 2022 – over £1,800 per household.
- Public ownership could cost £90.3 billion, equal to just two years of profits at the 2022 level.
- The ability to freeze household energy bills would have meant that inflation was at least 4.1% lower.

It's clear the economy isn't working for workers and only benefits the extraordinarily rich and shareholders.

Continuing to leave our critical infrastructure in the hands of profiteers comes at a high cost, but it does not need to be like this. We need an energy system which functions to meet our needs, not prioritise profiteering.
